Curly Leaf Pondweed Update

Thank you to everyone who contributed time and money this year to the fight against Curly leaf pondweed. Chemical treatment was completed in early June by Lake Restoration. At the time of treatment we could identify 27 acres requiring treatment.

We met our fundraising goal for 2005–2006. On page 5 of the newsletter is a copy of the report Marlin Grant made to the Sugar Lake Board regarding the Curly leaf cutting program. We did not come close to meeting our goals in that area.

The worst case scenario projection last year was 90 acres identified this year. Approximately 120 acres have been identified, considerably above the worst case scenario. This is the bad news. The good news is:

- 1. The areas that were chemically treated this year show stunted growth. Chemical treatment may work.
- 2. We have learned more what it is going to take to fight Curly leaf and can prepare ourselves this year.
- 3. We have next year to try again.



This plant has reached the point of being a "nuisance" for many on the lake. It decreases our property values and impacts our use of the lake. If it doubles next year it could be 240 acres. Expect another fundraising campaign this year with a higher goal and when the volunteer coordinator for cutting curly leaf calls, please help.

Dear Sugar

The Loon that was occupying the nesting platform is no longer there. Can you give me an update? **Empty Nester**.



Dear Empty Nester: I am pleased to inform you that as a result of our efforts, not one, but two more baby loons now call Sugar Lake home. The chicks were hatched June 10th and the entire family stayed around the nesting platform for a few days. We were getting concerned because the other loons on the lake had already hatched their young. Our worries were for not, however. They seem to have now taken up residency in the Sunset Point bay. At the June SLA meeting, Jim Castle reported 3 sets of Loons on the lake. The pair on the south end has one chick and ours, in the bay, have 2. There is another pair with no chicks and we are thinking they may be first time returnees from the Gulf of Mexico. Loons spend the winter in the Gulf. The first year chicks stay there for 3 years before returning to the same lake where they were born. They must find proper accommodations upon arrival, or they won't bare any young. They may then move on to another lake. Several factors determine the number of loons a lake can support. It is said that the more loons on a lake, the healthier the lake. The nesting season is now over and the platforms have been removed.

It is now up to Mother Nature and the parents to bring the chicks to maturity. We can help, however, by giving them space. Remember, Loons are wild creatures and need a lot of it. Enjoy their beauty and grace from a distance.

Corinna Township Comprehensive Plan

The township planning task force is at work developing the comprehensive plan. They meet at the township hall every Second and Fourth Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. The public is welcome to attend.

Wright County is considering an ordinance requiring Corinna property owners to obtain permits, variances, etc, from the county as well as from the township, should Corinna elect to do its own planning and zoning. To allow time for public comment this item was continued to the July 20, 2006, hearing at 7:30 p.m. It is important for Corinna Township residents to attend this hearing and be involved and informed about possible changes in the township.

Corinna Township Gravel Mining Hearing

On Tuesday, June 6, the Township board passed a moratorium on the establishment or expansion of gravel mining operations. The moratorium ordinance provides for a one year study period for Goal, Policies, and Implementation Strategies to be identified and for the potential adoption of enhanced zoning controls that will provide for consistency and/or increased standards as may be currently required by the Wright County Zoning Ordinance Regulations.

The following report was made at the June Sugar Lake Board meeting by Marlin Grant. It was decided that the entire text of Marlin's report should be printed in the June newsletter:

Curly leaf pondweed cutting report

The best way I can describe our war against curly leaf this year is by saying we lost the battle this year. When I say "we" I am referring to every property owner on the shores of Sugar Lake, all the members of our association, and any and all persons who enjoy or have an interest in Sugar Lake.

We planned an attack against the weed with a volunteer army. Unfortunately we had only 4 true volunteers from our lake, one 86 years old, one 79, one 70, and one in his 60's. Four others agreed to help when called. Three other volunteers from St Cloud Muskies Inc made the trip to our lake to help and would have provided more help but our cutting equipment broke. By the time we get it operating again it may be too late to cut anymore this year. The curly leaf will have already sunk to the lake bottom, reseeding itself for next years cycle.



So what do we do now?

If we are serious in our quest to save Sugar Lake from Curly leaf pondweed infestation and treasure our lake and want to be able to swim and boat in it all summer long we must regroup and each and every one of us dedicate ourselves to this cause for next year and the years to follow.

Not everyone can provide physical labor or substantial money to this cause. However, everyone needs to do something to help. To protect the value of their own property, every property owner should be able to donate an additional \$100 over and above the association annual dues. \$100 is a drop in the bucket compared to what they will lose if they can't get to their property by water because of Curly leaf infestation. Being able to get to one's property should be worth a sizeable amount of money each year.

We are fortunate that there are some on our lake who work continuously to save the lake, including those who have more knowledge of weeds, the divers, those who work on fundraising, and many others. We owe these people a great amount of thanks. Our lake needs more people like them.

What should our association do for next year?

- 1. The Curley leaf must be located this year to determine where to treat and cut next spring. Dale Gustafson and I will be doing this.
- 2. Our association must have committed volunteers this year to provide the labor for next year. The time period is estimated to be two weeks between May 15 and June 15 or a fourteen day period. We will need 20 workers per day for 14 days equaling 280 work days. For 60 volunteers this would be 5 days per person, for 100 volunteers only 3 days per person. These volunteers need to select this year which of the 14 days they will make themselves available to work. Those who are not retired may need to plan vacation during this period. Those who are physically unable to help due to illness or or age perhaps can get family members or friends to fill in for them. If volunteers can't be found the association will need to hire people to do this work. If such persons are even available to to work for an approximate two week period. If such workers could be found at a rate of \$25 per hour times 8 hours per day times 280 days the cost would be \$56,000 for the labor only. Once the required labor is lined up the association needs to line up the equipment and determine the cost.
- 3. There may be some property owners who feel that by the use of their weed rollers or their individual chemical treatment of their beach that they have done what is necessary or expected of them. Unfortunately this weed grows out to 16 feet of water depth so weed rolling or chemical treatments along the shore do not cover an area of that magnitude.
- 4. Those who aren't concerned because Curly leaf is not growing in front of their property need to to reconsider. It is like living in a forest where there is a fire across the forest from you. If you don't help put out the fire it will spread and consume your property eventually.

Our association must find a way to get financial and labor commitments from those that use and enjoy the lake in one form or another. It must be done this year to be ready for next year's battle against Curly leaf pondweed.

The board of directors and the entire lake association has a huge task to accomplish. Good luck.

Area Highlights By Doc Williams The Sugar Bowl Dance Hall

Back in the dust bowl days of the mid 30's, Sugar Lake was a lot smaller. A farmer on the west side grew corn in what is now Addison Bay. The North Bay was also a lot smaller and rumor has it, that a man could walk from Sunset Point to the opposite shore without having to swim. There were no privately owned lake homes on Sugar at the time, although there were 8 resorts; but that's for another article. The fishing was as good as ever. A man by the name of Herman Kaiser was reported to have speared a 33 pound Northern. Although times were hard, there was still a need for people to get together and have fun. Al Swanberg owned some property, by what is today the north landing. That land is now underwater and part of the lake. He was a wheeler dealer and sensing money to be made, decided to build the Sugar Bowl Dance Hall. It was a place where people from around the lake, as well as Silver Creek, Annandale, Monticello and Maple Lake would gather 1 or 2 nights a week for dances. Sometimes upwards of 150 people would show up. It cost 30 cents to get in and 3/2beer, which was legal during prohibition, was a nickel. It was also available for wedding receptions. Al had 4 brothers: Ray, Franz,

Harry, and Walt. Ray was the band leader and played accordion at the Sugar Bowl. Walt's wife Sis, played the piano and Franz was the drummer. Asa Smith (no relation) was the sax man. Did I mention that Ray was also a wheeler dealer? Besides being the band leader, he ran a barber shop inside the Silver Creek State Bank. When opportunity knocked, he bought the local hardware store, and you guessed it, moved his barber shop over there. The Sugar Bowl only lasted 2 & ½ years, before one night, it burned to the ground. This wasn't all bad because the lake had started to rise and Al was loosing land. Undaunted, he headed to Indian Lake where he built yet another dance hall and called it......the Sugar Bowl. Alas, it burned down in only 2 years. No one knows, or is willing to say, what Al may have been doing in the back room, after hours, to cause the fires, but one can only surmise. So goes the saga of Al and the Sugar Bowl Dance Hall.
