We feel we are making headway in reducing the spread of curly leaf pondweed by removing this weed before it goes dormant and sinks to the bottom of the lake with the seeds that can begin growing anytime within 7 years, as per the DNR. The challenge is that this weed is only accessible for cutting during a 2 to 3 week period, typically in June, so a lot of volunteer help is needed for that short period.

Our thanks also to Gary and Glen Lindmeyer for the use of their flat bottom boat again. Also, we owe a debt of gratitude to Steve Ziebarth at Z-Marine for his cooperation and help in keeping the weed cutting boat going. (By the way, Steve currently has many super mid-season discount prices on boats and motors Tell him you are a member of the Sugar Lake Assn.)

Give Our Lake a Break

The curly leaf pondweed cutting is done for this year. There is no need to be cutting any submergent vegetation, including milfoil. If you spot what you believe is milfoil, please contact a board member.

Curly leaf is at the stage in its life cycle where the parent plant dies and disperses seed for next year in the form of seed pods called turions. The parent plant often breaks at the base and may float around the lake. If any wash up on your shore, please remove them.

Water Quality Report

The heavy rain of this last month has reminded us of how at risk our lake is. During these past storms we had several situation where excessive runoff carried silt and nutrients into the lake. It points out that we have many areas where we need to make improvements to better withstand heavy rains without detrimental erosion into the lake.

Also we have completed the contract for the work on Hollister Creek. The work should start the week of July 14. This is our first major project for water quality improvement and it will take at least a year before it is ready to redirect runoff into the new creek bed. This is not a total solution to the problems in this portion of the lake, but it is a definite start to solving the problems of the Hollister Creek area.

Diane's Lights Night

Luminaries were first used for Diane's Lights Night back in 1996 but they originated in Spain during the 16th century. They were called farolitos or little lanterns and Spanish settlers would burn small fires along the roads and in the church yards to commemorate Christ's birth. Other writers placed them even earlier linking it to the Jewish celebration of Hanukkah. Traditions of luminaries were celebrated for many years by the Pueblo Indi-



ans in New Mexico before spreading to communities throughout the United States, Canada, and Europe. They were bonfires of crisscrossed pine boughs arranged in 3-foot high squares. By the 19th century American settlers brought beautiful Chinese lanterns to hang from their doorways instead of building bonfires. But the lanterns were too expensive for many people so they began to make small lanterns out of paper sacks to save money. Luminaries are linked through history to the ancient tradition of communicating, warning, and celebrating through linked bonfires.

The Lake Water Sampling Story

- 1. Water quality monitoring: Sugar Lake participates in the "Citizens Lake Monitoring Program" along with lakes in 31 Minnesota counties. Wright County has 46 lakes participating. The purpose of this effort is to form a long—term data base to compare our lake to others in our ecoregion and trophic state and identify trends in clarity and quality.
- 2. Participants: Jim Kastl has been reporting secchi disk and lake level readings to the MPCA since 1974. Ed and Jan Quinn have been reporting secchi disk readings and delivering water samples to the WSWCD since 1997. Andy Juetten is tracking rainfall.
- 3. Definitions:
 - MPCA: Minnesota Pollution Control Agency
 - WSWCD: Wright Soil And Water Conservation District
 - RMB : RMB Environmental Laboratories Inc. in Detroit Lakes MR
 - STORET: National Water Quality Data Repository
 - Ecoregion: Sugar Lake is classified as Northern Central Hardwood Forest. There are seven ecoregions in MN.
 - Trophic State: Sugar Lake is classified as mesotrophic. There are four tropic states in MN. They range from deep clear lakes in northern MN to shallow lakes with heavy algae blooms in central and southern MN.
 - Total Phosphorous: Amount of nutrients.
 - Chorophyll-a: Amount of algae.
 - Secchi disk : A white metal disk 8 inches in diameter that is lowered into the water to measure transparency.
 - Mean TSI: Tropic State Index. This index combines total phosphorous, chorophyll-a, and secchi disk readings. Our TSI mean from 2002 2008 is 46. The range is from 0 to 100 with 0 being best.
- 4. Results: Secchi disk readings from 1974 thru 2007: The range is from 6.9 feet in 1976 to 14.5 feet in 1980. The reading in 2007 was 9.5 feet. RMB states, "This is within expected range," This year the readings have been 10 feet, which has been about average for the last 34 years. The variations are probably due to storm events. Please remember these readings are taken in the middle of the lake and do not reflect conditions at culverts and steams. Total Phosphorous: Data collected by the MPCA from 1997 thru 2006 shows the mean value of 19 ppb (parts per billion). RMB shows 18.4 ppb from 2002-2008. RMB states, "decreasing, which indicates improving water quality (90% confidence). Chorophyll-a: RMB data from 2002-2008 shows a mean value of 7.5 ppb. They state "no trend" and "within expected range." The MPCA data from 1997 thru 2006 shows 6.8 ppb. Its graph shows this to be on the high side for a mesotrophic lake. STORET data from 1990 : Total phosphorous was 20 ppb. Chlorophyll-a was 4.9 ppb. The mean secchi disk reading was 9.5 feet.

Vegetation Report

Things have been happening quickly this month for the vegetation committee. After our spring treatment for curly leaf pondweed early this month, we started looking for new infestations of invasive plants. Unfortunately, we did discover a new area of Eurasian water milfoil on the west shore. We identified the area and applied for a permit to treat the new area. Our permit is under consideration at this time, but we do not have permission to treat as yet. If you are on the west side near the Paul Gustafson property I would suggest you keep you watering of you lawn and gardens up to date, as we may get authorization to treat and that would mean that you should not use lake water for a couple weeks after treatment. Watch for signs and we will also send a news flash about any treatments that we will make.

We have also been busy with cutting of curly leaf pondweed. Marlin Grant and a few volunteers have been cutting and removing patches of curly leaf pondweed where it has grown tall enough to be cut by our power cutter. They have spent many days cutting, removing the cuttings from the lake, and hauling them away to be composted. We owe the volunteers a special thanks for their hard work on this effort.

On June 30 Carolyn Dindorf and her assistants started the first summer survey of aquatic plants in our lake. This sampling is being done at about 200 pre-determined locations in order to determine percentages of native and invasive plants. There will be three surveys this summer to establish a baseline for the plant life in Sugar Lake. These surveys will be part of our vegetation plan and help with our continued plan to control invasive plants in Sugar Lake.

We still need help locating any new infestations of curly leaf pondweed and Eurasian water milfoil. Please check around your property and report any findings of these plants to a board member or member of the vegetation committee so they can be identified and entered into our database for future treatment.
