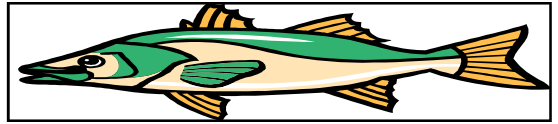

Vegetation Committee

Curly Leaf Pondweed

The Vegetation Committee has been hard at work this spring identifying and treating areas of curly leaf pondweed. We have identified and treated areas by the north public landing, in Addison Bay, and the Northwest Bays. This year is the first time we have treated Curly leaf pondweed, and in order to have any positive effect on this plant we must continue treatment for several years. It is likely that it will take three to five years to even be able to see if we are having a significant effect.

In order to reduce the numbers of “seeds” (called turions) that are produced, we need to interrupt the turion production cycle. That can be done either with chemicals in the early spring or by cutting later in the spring. We want everyone to be looking for this pest and report it to your area communicator or someone from the Vegetation Committee. Once identified and mapped, we will ask you to remove or cut in your area. (Our hope is that neighbors will get together and perform this task.) It is not possible that the Vegetation Committee can do this on its own, and if we need to hire professionals to do the work it will get rather expensive. Let’s see what we can do by working together.

It is important to remove the plants from the lake for two reasons: one, it is a state law, and, two, if the plants are not removed they will decompose and release the nutrients back into the water, contributing to algae development and harming the native vegetation.

Eurasian water milfoil

We will be treating the EWM again this year in a couple of stages. We have identified two significant patches at this time that we intend to treat soon. One is in a previous location in Addison Bay by the culvert, and the other is a new batch at the entry to the northernmost of the northwest bays.

We have hired Buddy Divers to do a lakewide search most likely during the second week of June. That survey, along with the information from our Millfoil spotter crew, will determine where we treat this summer. It is our hope to treat those areas in mid to late June, and we encourage everyone to look in the next few weeks for any new batches of Milfoil.

To date we have been either lucky or successful at keeping the quantity of EWM small in Sugar Lake. We are clearly the exception. In most lakes it spreads rapidly once it gets started and becomes a huge problem. We must remain diligent in protecting our lake. These are critical times for our lake and we need to go that extra mile to do everything we can to protect our resource. We all can do little things, so let’s remember to “Give Our Lake A Break.”

Curlyleaf Pondweed



Curlyleaf pondweed most likely arrived in Minnesota near the turn of the century in containers used to bring common carp from Germany to the United States. It is native to Eurasia, Africa, and Australia. The DNR has identified it in Sugar Lake. It has reddish-green leaves that are wavy at the edges. The leaves have fine teeth along the edge and are oblong, measuring about 1/2” wide and 2 to 3” long. The plant grows from shore to depths of 15’. Its growth cycle begins in the fall September to October time frame when it has little competition from native plants. The main method of new growth is from winter buds called “turions”. With its growth cycle beginning under the ice, curlyleaf pondweed is one of the first nuisance aquatic plants to appear in the spring. It forms dense surface mats in the spring that severely impact recreational activities including fishing, swimming, and boating as well as restricting the growth of

native species. The plant dies back in early summer at the same time the algae population is growing rapidly. The curlyleaf decomposition increases the amount of phosphorus in the lake and contributes to algae blooms. Control options include cutting and mechanical harvesting. Some aquatic herbicides can be used to control curlyleaf pondweed. Herbicide control can be difficult due to the plants similarity to native aquatic species. The best time to look for and treat curlyleaf pondweed is in the spring soon after ice-out.



Water Patrol

Remember to renew or obtain your swim raft permit. Contact the Wright County Sheriff's Department at 763-682-7622. Your permit # must be displayed and the raft must be reflectorized to reflect light from all directions.

Water Quality Improvement

106th Street Project - The PCA permit has been received by the Corinna Township so they can now continue with the construction on 106th street and a holding pond. Construction should start after Memorial Day.

115th Street Project - Wright County Soil and Water has approved going ahead with a buffer strip on this property. The Sugar Lake Association would like to thank the landowners, **Larry and Marion Sandfort**, for participating in this program. **Gene Smith**, who farms the land, was also instrumental in putting this project together. The motion passed last month to spend \$500 on a one-year grass crop for this buffer strip was rescinded. A new motion was made and passed to spend \$650 for the cost of seed and planting the buffer strip in native perennials. Tony with North American Prairies Company has been retained to plant 5 acres of grass and wildflowers.

Rainfall

Dear Sugar

Dear Sugar, I have switched to phosphorus free fertilizer for my lake lot but have some left-over fertilizer that contains phosphorus. What should I do with this fertilizer? From Worried about fertilizer.

Dear Worried about fertilizer: Incorporate your left-over fertilizer into your compost pile or soil. Once phosphorous is in the soil it is locked to the soil particles until plants use it.

Wright Co. Cooperative Lake Monitoring Program

Did you know that we are a part of a program designed by the state to establish trends in the water quality of MN lakes? We have volunteers who have been collecting data once a month, May through September since 2001, on water clarity, amount of total phosphorus, and chlorophyll-A (algae).

The data is turned in to Wright Co. Soil and Water Conservation in Buffalo. They in turn send it into Environmental Laboratories Inc, in Detroit Lakes for analysis. The results are published on this website:

www.rmbel.info Check it out! Kind of interesting to compare Sugar Lake's data to the other 34 lakes in Wright Co. who are participants. We have also been turning in data on water clarity to the state for analysis since 1974. Data for participating lakes in Wright Co., published in November of 2003, identified Sugar Lake as one of three lakes who had a significant negative trend in transparency. Seventeen lakes exhibited no change, and seven showed a significant improvement in transparency over time. We would like to extend a big thank-you to our data collectors, Ed and Jan Quinn, Jim Kastl, and BJ Bjorkman. For all those Jr. Limnologists out there, who want to know exactly how this data is collected, here's how it works:

1. Water clarity is measured in the middle of the lake using a secchi disk, which is dropped over the side of the boat and watched until it is no longer visible. Depth is measured by half foot increments on the rope the disk is attached to.
2. The phosphorus sample is collected by transferring water from a sampling tube to a 1/2 pint plastic bottle. A vial of sulfuric acid is then added to preserve the phosphorus.
3. The water sample to be analyzed for chlorophyll-A (algae) is taken from the sampling tube and placed in a 2 liter amber bottle, which is placed in a cooler with an ice pack.

Watch for a pontoon boat in the middle of the lake (when the lake is quiet— usually morning or evening) on these upcoming dates: June 20, July 18, August 15, Sept. 19 . Feel free to say 'hi' and watch the data collectors at work.
