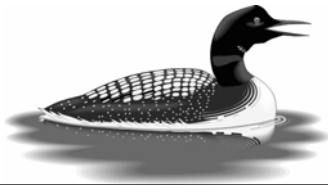
Dear Sugar Lake Residents,

Vegetation Report

Invasive plant treatments.

This has indeed been a strange spring and the conditions in our lake have been strange as well. Until recently we had almost no vegetation growth and all the plants are way behind their normal schedule of growth. On Wednesday, May 21, I spent a good portion of the day on the lake with the DNR checking for areas to treat for Curly leaf and Eurasian water milfoil. Our agent okays treatment of 29 acres and that treatment was made on May 22. It is important to notice the signs for the treatment areas and be sure to remind your friends and neighbors that they should not use water from those areas for irrigation for 7 days. The chemical can harm sensitive flowers and plants. There are no restrictions on use of the lake or taking or eating fish. We will continue to monitor the lake to see if there may be some follow-up treatments. We do expect that we will treat Eurasian water milfoil later, and that we will cut Curly leaf pondweed in a few weeks if we get enough volunteers to help Marlin and his team. We really need volunteers for this effort!

The Association has hired Carolyn Dindorf of Fortin Consulting, Inc. to do our plant surveys this year. Carolyn is certified by the state and is also doing surveys for the DNR on special project lakes. She will do sampling in the treated areas within the next two weeks, followed by a complete lake survey in June and another in August. These samplings are part of the process of documenting the level of expansion of invasive plants and providing information for the treatment during the 2009 season.

Sugar Lakescapers

A plant exchange was held at Karen Sutherland's Saturday, May 17, immediately following the May board meeting. The weather was perfect and attendance was very good. A profit of \$178 was returned to the Sugar Lake Association. Grant Everson, with Hasty Woods Tree Farm & Nursery, (320-558-2432), was also at the exchange with a nice selection of native plants for sale as well as advice and answers to questions. The event was a big success and plans are being made for next year. Save your plastic nursery pots this year for use at the exchange next year. Annual Fishing Contest Saturday, June 28th!

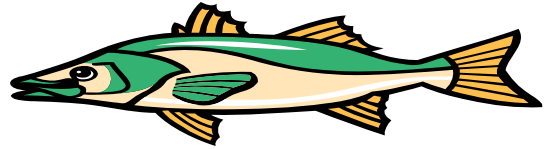
When: 9 a.m. to noon. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. Weigh in at noon.

However, the real big news was our storm on May 25 and all the sediment that was washed into the lake with that storm. It does point out how important it is that we continue to work on improvement projects that will reduce the chance of sediment runoff. We saw many areas where excessive runoff occurred even with our efforts to protect those sites. This storm reminds us that if you have any project (regardless of size) under construction you really need to protect that soil from a storm like this past one.

Curly leaf spotting

We have learned that the best way to locate areas of Curly leaf pondweed is by the use of a rake on the end of a rope. You toss the rake out about 25 feet and drag in a sample of vegetation and check to see if you have curly in the rake. We are planning on training more people that can help with locating batches of Curly leaf pondweed around the lake. The process is simple and with a little help it is easy to make the identification. Birder's Corner

There is a great website for people interested in birding in Minnesota. <http://www.ornithologicalunion.org>. It lists the sightings in Minnesota. We have had a lot of activity with birds returning to the lake this month.

Dennis & Mary Langhoff sighted a male pileated woodpecker on a recently cut down tree. There was one off and on at our suet feeder this winter. They are so much bigger than any other woodpecker that they are easy to spot.

Deb Grimm saw a male orchard oriole and Baltimore orioles. I put grape jam out for the orioles and when the raccoons don't eat it, the birds love it.

Vince Bangasser reports an eagle's nest on the southwest side of the lake with an eaglet in the nest. I have also heard that someone saw two little heads sticking up.

Jim Kastl, who has been devotedly monitoring our lake for the association for decades, and his family have seen a great list of birds. They include: yellow warbler, downy woodpecker fly catcher, purple martin, chickadee, nuthatch, northern bluebird, hooded warbler, purple finch, yellow breasted warbler, oriole and goldfinch.

My favorite find this month was a rose-breasted grosbeak. They are easily recognized by the red patch on their breast. It is not so much rose as bright red during mating season.

Thank you so much to everyone who emailed their sightings. It was fun for me because people even sent pictures. Maybe we can find a way for Craig to put the pictures on the web site.

Loon platforms

The loon nesting platforms were checked recently and only 1 of the 4 was found to be occupied. As we approached the one in use, we observed the nesting loon lower its head in an apparent



attempt to conceal itself. Even though we thought we were keeping our distance, it soon became clear that we were an unwelcome visitor. In order to keep from upsetting the Loon further, we quickly exited the area. This is the third year we have embarked on the venture and although the platforms are identical, only one, located in the same area, continues to produce results. There could be several reasons for this. One possibility, the loons may have found a natural nesting sight in the area and preferred it. Another reason might be that 2 of the platforms are near fishing areas and the resulting boat traffic may have discouraged the birds. It could simply be that the Loons may know something we don't and are waiting for us to figure it out. As far as we can tell the one successful platform looks like it is the result of the age old adage: location, location, location.

Curly leaf pondweed cutting

We will soon be starting the cutting and harvesting of curly leaf pondweed.

This is a labor intensive project that is a very important part of our curly leaf management program. We need volunteers to help with cutting, harvesting, hauling, and coordinating.
