Sugar Lake vegetation, past and present

This year was very similar to other years relative to the control of Aquatic Invasive Species in Sugar Lake. We treated 23.5 acres of Curly leaf pondweed (CLP) and 12.4 acres of Eurasian water milfoil (EWM). It seems over the years that the numbers change back and forth but are generally similar. Here is a review of our treatments in the past.

We identified Eurasian water milfoil in Sugar Lake in the early 1990's. For the next 10 years or so, Sugar Lake was a special battlefront for the DNR. With the input of our members who located the general areas, the DNR arranged for the treatments and paid the costs. Most of these treatments were small areas around the lake and EWM did not become a serious problem for many years. It was very important that in that time the Sugar Lake Association started raising money to fight the battle of the future against Aquatic Invasive Plants. That early start and continued determination has meant that the SLA could pay for treatments that were permitted. That is an effort that the entire association should be proud of.

In 2000, the DNR determined that they could not eliminate EWM from a lake once it got established; they switched the use of the DNR money to protect lakes from getting infected. That meant that Sugar Lake was on its own to pay for treatment. Fortunately, the fund that had been started in the previous decade

was large enough to pay our way. In the years between 2000 and 2008, our EWM became more abundant and Curly leaf pondweed (CLP) also started to be a problem. From about 2002 to 2008 we really struggled to get permission to treat enough area to keep CLP and EWM in check. After three years of applying for the "Whole Lake and Whole Bay Pilot Project," we were accepted in 2009 and that year we were able to treat 188 acres of CLP. With the ability for the first time to treat all the areas that were infested, we achieved a great victory over CLP and also continued our battle with EWM.

In 2012, the "Whole Lake and Whole Bay Pilot Project" ended, and we have gone back to the rules of old regulating how much we can treat. Sugar Lake is about 1015 acres in size. The area of the lake that is 15 feet or less in depth is 357 acres and is called the littoral area. By the old rule and the now new rule, we will be allowed to treat only 15% of that area or 53.5 acres. If we need to treat more than that we have to apply for a special variance for that treatment. It is my feeling that, unlike some other lakes, we will be able to get that variance if we continue to manage the lake as we have. We also need to develop and get approved a new Lake Vegetation Management Plan this winter. We have been fortunate in the past, but we do not know what the future will bring. It looks like we will have to continue treating these two plants as we have in the past, while we continue to prepare for what the future will bring to Sugar Lake.

Minnesota Coalition of Lake Associations (MNCOLA)

The Wright County Coalition of Lake Associations is hosting the November Board meeting of the MNCOLA on Thursday November 20th at the Ney Nature Center located just north of Maple Lake off County Road 8. Because Sugar Lake is a member of the Wright COLA we have a delegate on this Board and have offered to host this meeting for the State organization.

The agenda is packed full of information about what the MNCOLA is doing for all the lake associations of Minnesota. The most significant item on the agenda is the presentation of the Legislative Agenda for this coming year. Also there will be an update on the attempt of MNCOLA to get a 25 million dollar grant to set up AIS decontamination stations around the state to inspect and decontaminate boats before they enter a Minnesota lake. That application failed to gain the support of the Lessard-Sams Commission that allocates about 90 million dollars of Legacy Money per year. The Legacy Money comes from the 3/8th of 1% Sales tax increase that the citizens of Minnesota approved five years ago. This tax will remain in effect for twenty years, and so far almost no money has been allocated to fight Aquatic Invasive Species. Of course "lake people" feel this is not fair, and the MNCOLA is fighting hard to get a share of the Clean Water money to help keep Aquatic Invasive Species in check. These are the types of issues Sugar Lake or the Wright County lakes could not fight for on our own, but as part of the statewide organization of Lake Associations we are able to be recognized.

Zebra Mussels in Sugar Lake? Lets do all we can to prevent that.

Sugar Lake is especially at risk for several reasons. Our lake appears to be an ideal environment for the Zebra Mussels so our infestation could be worse than many. We have a lot of boat traffic that could easily come from infected water such as Mille Lacs, Lake Minnetonka, or the Mississippi River to name a few. With many lakes and rivers with Zebra Mussels in Minnesota, almost any boat could be spreading them. We have so many people using our lake and so many pieces of equipment being put in the lake that everyone needs to know that every item needs to be decontaminated before being placed in the water. Having your dock out of the water for the winter takes care of the equipment that you put back into the lake, but any item taken out of an infested lake could spread them into our lake in the summer.



If Zebra Mussels get established in Sugar Lake we could expect these changes: Water clarity would increase and our native and invasive plants would thrive deeper in the lake and much thicker. This alone could be worse than Eurasian water milfoil or Curly leaf pond weed. All boats, docks, lifts, rafts left in the water would get coated with layers of Zebra Mussels making them difficult to handle and remove. Irrigation systems would get clogged and not function. Any outboard motor with the lower unit left in the water would be coated and clogged and ruined. All surfaces would get covered with shells requiring all swimmers to wear shoes and perhaps gloves to prevent getting cut on the sharp edges of the shells. Not a pretty thought!!



More about Zebra Mussels

This little "clam" is usually less than 1" long but can get close to 2" long. Normally people will notice them when they are about the size of a fingernail. When they are just getting established on a smooth surface, they feel like sand paper.

Each female can produce about 500,000 eggs in a season. They are actively producing eggs from late spring to early fall. The eggs hatch into microscopic free-swimming organisms called veligers. At this stage (most of the summer) Zebra muscles can be spread with water. They "settle", get established, and start to reproduce within 6-7 weeks. This ability puts them among the most prolific of all animals.

The veligers can be spread with water and the adults (a few weeks old) can be spread with vegetation, mud, or any structure that is moved into another body of water.

We need everyone to be aware of how Zebra Mussels can spread and educate our friends and neighbors.. We are asking for volunteers, a couple per lake area to be spotters by having a Zebra "brick" or other surface that they can check every other week and report to zebra@sugarlake.org Send an e-mail now to volunteer.

There is so much to know about Zebra Mussels. Read more about them from these websites or consult our website (sugarlake.org) and get more informed. We need to be proactive on this issue, and it will take all of us to make a difference.


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March meeting
