Give Our Lake a Break

As you pull your docks and boat lifts out this fall look for zebra mussels. (See the zebra mussel article inside for more Information.)

Fall Clean-Up Time

Fall is a time of year when you can have a major impact on lake



water quality. All the beautiful trees around Sugar Lake will be losing their leaves soon. What we do with those leaves can directly affect the water quality of Sugar Lake. Decomposing tree leaves are a source of phosphorus. As they break down the phosphorus released can be washed into the lake by rainfall. Higher levels of phosphorus lead to algae blooms that decrease water clarity. Decreased water clarity is bad for the desirable native plant population and affects our recrea-

tional use of the lake and even property values.

Some of the things we can do to help this fall:

- Rake and remove the leaves. Take them to the Corinna Township yard on Ireland Ave just north of County Road 39.
- Compost the leaves. Composting breaks down organic material to a product that is beneficial to the soil and growing plants. Look at the Sugar lake website, www.sugarlake.org, for an article on starting a compost pile.
- Help a neighbor who can't manage fall cleanup alone. Make it a neighborhood social event.
- Hire a lawn service to clean-up for you if you don't have the time.
- Let the grass grow along the lakeshore or plan a buffer strip of native plants along the shore-

line. The longer grasses will catch leaves and debris that would otherwise blow into the lake.

• **Don't** burn your leaves.

Education

Zebra Mussels

Zebra mussels are a small freshwater mussel usually found in clusters. They have a D-shaped shell with dark and light colored stripes. Most are under an inch in size. Zebra mussels are filter feeders. They strain the wa-



ter removing microscopic plants and animals that form the base of the food chain. They become established regardless of depth, light intensity, or winter temperatures. They attach to firm surfaces and will cover rock, metal, rubber, wood, docks, boathulls, native mussels, and even aquatic plants. They also clog water supply pipes and boat engine cooling systems. In Minnesota, zebra mussels have been found in the Mississippi River, the St. Louis River, and Lake Superior. 106th Street Project complete

The 106th Street project at the south end of Sugar Lake near the south public access was recently completed to the satisfaction of all participants. The project involved the re-alignment of 106th Street 150 feet south of its original location. Those involved included lakeshore property owners along 106th Street, Corinna Township, John Topfer, and the Sugar Lake Association who followed the project with an interest in the water quality impact of the project. The excavating contractor was Dale Erdman. In addition to an excellent job on the road, a holding pond for farm run-off was built at the east end of the road. The pond, shown in the picture, accumulates water until it reaches the level of the culvert on the right side of the picture. Water from the culvert discharges north onto a grassy area leading to the lake. This pond is one example of capturing the first flush of rainwater as pre-



sented in earlier articles on "First Flush Fundamentals." Property owners along the road have planted disturbed land in native grass and wildflowers.

Dear Sugar

Dear Sugar. As I cruise the North Bay, I have been watching someone build a log house. Heard it came from another lake. Know anything about it? *Curious*.

Dear Curious: The cabin you have been watching is owned by Tom & Pam Pugh, and it once sat on the shores of

Mule Lake near Longville. Tom's grandfather had it built in 1940 using timbers that were growing on the property. In 2000 the state purchased the land to expand a state park. Tom and his son Steve decided to dismantle the cabin and move it to Sugar Lake, much to the joy of Tom's dad. They had to keep the look exact, so when dismantling it, each wall received a letter of the alphabet and each log received a number. A log garage was also dismantled and used to replace rotten logs in the cabin. Boulders, from their shoreline on Mule Lake, were transported here to recreate the original look of the property. Tom even chiseled the "split stones" off the face of the fireplace so he could reuse them. It took a year to get everything down here using only a pickup truck and flatbed trailer. A "Corn blaster" and 3 or 4 sandings returned the logs to their original beauty. With the exception of putting in the foundation and placing the 48-foot ridge beam, the Pugh's have done



the work entirely by hand (back hurt yet?). It has taken 3 years, working weekends, to get it to what you see now. The cabin is 1400 square feet and has 3 bedrooms. A 4th bedroom is being incorporated into the kitchen to make it larger. Energy efficient doors and windows replaced the original ones. The huge living room, with vaulted log ceilings, overlooking the lake, recreates the charm that it had. A corner stone was placed in a basement wall and reads: Mule Lake 1940, Sugar lake 2001. Tom says it will be finished in 1 year, but Pam said he has been saying that for 2 years now. Will they live in it year round once it is completed, depends on whom you ask.
