Give Our Lake a Break

This is a special time of the year for the lake. Plants stop growing and start shedding their leaves. Because we no longer have woods up to the shore of the lake, the leaves can be easily blown into the lake. Leaves are a very high source of phosphorus and quite harmful to our water quality. Because of that we urge you to do everything you can to collect and properly dispose of fallen leaves. Come up to the lake-often and rake and bag leaves each time. That way the job is small and the lake benefits are large.

Proposed Development

The Wright County Planning Commission held a public hearing in Buffalo on September 15 to consider a proposal to rezone 82.14 acres on the east side of Sugar Lake from Agricultural use to Residential use. The purpose of the rezoning request is to permit the development of three lake lots (1 acre each) and 13 back lots (5 acres each). The area proposed for rezoning is the lakeshore between areas H and J, with back lots behind areas H, J, and K. A map showing the proposed area can be seen on the Sugar Lake Association website at www.sugarlake.org. Corinna Township has already approved the rezoning "as it is consistent with the Land Use Plan."

About 50 to 60 Sugar Lake Association members, board members, and neighbors of the proposed development attended the hearing. Several people from the Sugar Lake group spoke and expressed concerns about the impact of the development. Those concerns included:

- The water quality of Sugar Lake will potentially be impacted negatively both during and after construction. (As reported by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency Sugar Lake is currently one of 2 lakes in Wright County cited as having "declining water quality.) Proper erosion control is *critical* when building in the watershed.
- The proposed lots do not fit the topography of the land; there are watershed drainage, bluff, and wetland issues which make building and location of septic systems problematic.
- Five acre lots are small for the area in question; adjacent property is zoned for 10 acre lots.
- The addition of 16 new homes will increase traffic on Hart Ave.
- The possibility of lake access from the 13 back lots will impact negatively on the both the Lake and current neighboring residents.
- The preservation of the stand of bulrushes in front of the property is important for the health of the Lake.
- Much of this land includes one of the few remnants of Minnesota's "Big Woods" forest-how many trees would be cut down?
- The Corinna Township Land Use Plan does not reflect the current situation should it be revisited?
- There is not enough information to grant the rezoning request at this time.

The Planning Commission pointed out that they were considering *only* the re-zoning request at the current time. They maintained that many of the concerns expressed would be more appropriately addressed at later stages of the project.

The Planning Commission decided to continue the rezoning request until the next meeting on Thursday, October 20, 2005, at 8PM. They also planned a site visit at the end of September to look at the property in person.

The Sugar Lake Association board discussed the rezoning request and process at length during the September 17, 2005, meeting. The Board decided to draft a motion stating the board position. The following motion was unanimously approved by the Sugar Lake Board:

That the Planning Commission delay action on rezoning until the Corinna Township Land Use Plan is updated. If they choose not to delay, we recommend one house per 10 acres on the back lots and the lake lots be 225 feet of lakeshore per lot.

It is **critical** that people show up at the October 20 Planning Commission meeting. If you can't attend the meeting, write a short letter to Wright County Planning and Zoning regarding the rezoning and development request on Sugar Lake. Letters and statements at the hearings are in *the record* and play an important role in the decision making process. Vegetation

A full lake vegetation survey was recently completed as the first part of the LVMP (Lake Vegetation Management Plan). The survey was directed by Steve McComas of Blue Water Science. SLA members Chris Behm, Dan Erdman, Marlin Grant, Dale Gustafson, Steve Huff, and Don Peterson helped pull samples and map GPS coordinates. Thirty transects (perpendicular lines out from the lake shore) were identi-

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around the lake. GPS coordinates were recorded for each transect. At each transect a sample was taken at 0-5 feet, 5-10 feet, 10-15 feet and greater than 15 feet. The content of each sample was recorded including plant species and the density of each

species. One hundred twenty total samples were taken. Thirty species of plants were identified. In October core samples of the lake bottom will be taken for analysis. The information gathered will be used to develop the LVMP. The plan will help guide our aquatic invasive species treatments and give us a measuring tool.



Healthy Lakes Reunion

In 2003 the Sugar Lake Association participated in the Healthy Lakes and Rivers Program. The Initiative Foundation, sponsor of the Healthy Lakes program, held a reunion of past graduates of the program at their location in Little Falls. Dale Gustafson and Don Peterson attended. 25 lake associations were present. Each gave a short presentation on what is going on with their group. The Healthy Lakes Program has had 140 groups go through training and more than 1 million dollars have been distributed in grant money.

Fishing news

Ed Dopart of Bloomington (guest of the Ostdiek's) caught this 40 inch 17 pound muskie on Sat., Sept 10 on a red/white daredevil. He was fishing in Area C in about 3 ft of water and was guided by Bill Moilanen.

Fisheries

The fisheries committee presented a proposal to implement experimental fishing regulations for Sugar Lake. Following is a summary of the proposal and a sequence of events:

Because of the concern we have for the fisheries of Sugar Lake we recommend that the DNR implement experimental fishing regulations for crappie and northern pike.

The crappie daily limit would be lowered to 5/day. This would have the effect of reducing the harvest somewhat and re-distributing the catch.

All northern pike between 24-36 inches would have to be released. This will improve the average size of northern pike and reduce the number of small northern pike.

These recommendations have been made with the help of advice from Paul Diedrich Area Fisheries Supervisor from Montrose.

Other benefits from the regulations may include increased survival of stocked walleye fingerlings and restoration of balance to the fish community. The community is out of balance because of the large number of small northern pike.

In order for regulations to be implemented we must follow DNR procedure. Signs alerting anglers are posted at the public access for 90 days during the open water season (2006). After that a public meeting is held to gather input from all interested anglers (September 2006). If approved the regulations would go into effect March 1, 2007, and be in place for 10 years.

The fisheries committee would like to poll the general membership to determine if there is support for these regulations. The newsletter could be used for this purpose.

Support from the lake association is essential for compliance. To a large degree the regulations will succeed if the lake association favors them.

Following the presentation and discussion, a motion was made and approved to poll the membership in the October newsletter.

An informational meeting will be held following the October board meeting:

October 15, 2005, 10 a.m. at the Corrina Township Hall.

Paul Diedrich will give a presentation on the proposed regulation changes followed by a discussion.

If you are interested in working with the fisheries committee, plan to attend this meeting.

Area Highlights

Sugar Lake Park Resort By Doc Williams



How many of you remember the "Sugar Lake Park Resort"? It was a place you could boat to and spend an evening dancing and partying. If you needed boat gas, minnows, or some basic food staples, you could buy it there. Several times, a boat owner would return to his craft after an evening of revelry to find his boat submerged. Someone had pulled the plug. The resort was located on the south-west side of the lake and was the place to go to for fun. The first private individual to own the property was James Maxwell. It was part of 146 acres he got from the US government and Abraham Lincoln on Nov 10, 1864. Thomas Connell purchased the 146 acres from Maxwell's estate in 1864 for \$200.00. On May 7, 1921, J.H. and Sarah Rutledge bought a few parcels of that land and turned it into Rutledge's Sugar Lake Park. Down through the years it was owned by Herman Trapp, Jacob Bergmann, Harry Gillham, H.N. Lungwitz, Mark Gilchrist, Alton & Arline Anderson, James McCarthy, Don Lubinski, and others. Business slowly went down hill until it was no longer economical to run and the park closed. Marlin Grant purchased the property in 1992, subdivided the land into 3 properties and gave it to his 3 youngest children. They all have lake homes there today. The park was located in Area "S" and Karen Pitra is the communicator. Back in the 30'S, the resort had a dance hall on the property that was open year around. Rumor has it, if you knew the owner; he would let you play the "one armed bandits" hidden in a back room. The hall burned on St. Patrick's Day in the mid 40's and one of the rental cabins was converted into what became Sugar Lake Park Resort. In the 60's, the resort again had a dance hall with Fridays being family night and Saturdays for adults. Sometimes you could dance to the music of Virgil Carlson's accordion. When the Andersons owned the place, they took out the two "2 holers" located out back and put in flush toilets. They also added 5 trailers that could be rented by the month or season. In the past, there were as many as 5 resorts on the lake. Now there remains only one; Warners. Unfortunately, with the price of land on Sugar, we may never again see a resort such as Sugar Lake Park.

Also when a person is constructing or improving a building it must be 75 to 100 feet from shore depending on the area of the lake. Tree and shrub removal is limited due to the need for protection of the shore line. For anymore additional information it is vital that a person should contact their lake association to ensure the safety and the health of Sugar Lake is maintained.

I hope that through the help of everyone who lives or comes to Sugar Lake that we can maintain and improve this lakes quality so that future generations can enjoy the same experiences that we are today. I hope that everyone will always find time to enjoy a cool splash in the water, a beautiful sunset, or just sit and relax while their family is enjoying their time on the lake.
