Compost your leaves this fall or take them to the Township compost site. Composting breaks down organic material to a product that is beneficial to the soil and growing plants.

Fishing Rules May Change on Sugar Lake

The next step in changing fishing regulations for Sugar Lake was taken September 14 at the Corinna Township hall. Paul Diedrich of the DNR Montrose Area Fisheries Office held a public meeting to gather comments and present background information on the proposed changes.

The DNR is proposing a 24-36 inch protected slot limit for northern pike. Anglers may take a limit of three, only one may be larger than 36 inches. Also proposed is a five fish daily bag for crappies.

The DNR decision on whether to proceed with the proposed change will be made this fall. Decisions on regulations are made in a collaborative way with Area, Regional, and Central Office Fisheries staff after gathering scientific data and angler input. If approved, this regulation would be in place at the start of the next angling season, March 1, 2007.

Fall Clean-up

We are lucky to have many beautiful trees around Sugar Lake. Sometimes in the fall we don't feel so lucky when we are faced with picking up all those leaves. It is important to lake water qual-



ity to clean up the leaves in the fall. While leaves have always fallen around the lake this time of year, we don't have as much natural shoreline to catch them before they blow into the lake. Leaves are a high source of phosphorus. When left in piles on our lake lots they break down and release phosphorus. The highest concentrations are released in the fall and spring of the first year.

Build your own compost pile or bag the leaves and take them to the Township compost site. Don't burn the leaves.

Area Highlights

Shelmire's Resort

The most luxurious resort on Sugar Lake in the 20's& 30's was Shelmire's Summer Hotel. It was located on the South East corner near where the SLA holds its yearly picnic today. The lake at the time was surrounded by farms and tracks of heavy timber. The resort consisted of 15 rental cabins and the Maple Lodge dining hall. The entire facility was considered thoroughly modern in every detail with broad screened porches and electric lighting. A sand bottom bathing beach where children could enter the water "with perfect safety" ran the entire length of the resort. Other

amenities included boating, horseshoe courts, croquet, hiking trails, and a splendid tennis court. If fishing was your game, there was anything from scrappy pumpkin seeds to northern pike that would weigh well over 20 pounds. The experience would "light the heart of any angler." One could visit the resort for a Sunday dinner, a weekend stay, or a month's vacation. A row boat was included with every cabin. Rates were \$2.50 per day or \$14.00 a week per person with children under 12 being \$1.00. There was also a family rate. An extra charge would be incurred for livery. No



better meals were to be had anywhere than the Maple Lodge dining hall at a cost of \$1.00 each and children 50 cents. Most of the hams and bacon served were cured on the adjoining farm. Fresh eggs were gathered daily and the milk and cream came from their "tested cows." The fried spring chicken from their poultry yard "would make you forget even the kind your mother used to make.." The resort could be reached by ticketing to Maple Lake or Annandale on the Soo line or to Hasty on the Great Northern railroads. Guests with reservations would be met at either station. For the owner of a motor car, it was an ideal objective. Those were the days!

Clearer water means higher lakeshore values

Would you like to increase the value of your lakeshore property without doing an expensive remodeling job? You can, by improving the water clarity of your lake. A recent Bemidji State University study showed a direct relationship between property values and water clarity. Lakes with clearer water were associated with higher property values, while lakes with less clarity were associated with lower property values.

The study looked at 1,205 properties sold on 37 lakes in the communities of Aitkin, Brainerd, Grand Rapids, Walker, Park Rapids and Bemidji. The study was modeled after one in Maine. Both studies found that water clarity was the most significant factor in determining the purchase price of lakeshore property.

One of the Minnesota researchers, Dr. Patrick Welle, said, "Now, realtors can talk of location, location, location and clarity, clarity, clarity."

The study found that a one meter increase in water clarity has an economic worth of \$50 per foot for lake frontage, or about \$5,000 for a typical property with 100 feet of lakeshore. And, a one meter decrease in clarity has a much higher proportionate loss in economic worth, averaging \$70 per foot of lake frontage.

So, what can lakeshore owners do to improve their lake's clarity? First, control stormwater runoff. Any water that runs off your roof, driveway and lawn should be captured before it reaches the lake. Rain gardens can accomplish this. So can buffer strips of native vegetation left between your lawn and the lake. Leaving nearby wetlands intact can help, too.

Second, property owners can improve water clarity by maintaining properly functioning septic systems. Non-compliant septics can release nutrients like phosphorous into a lake, which can cause the water to turn into something resembling pea soup.

Third, simply leave aquatic vegetation in place. Bullrushes, cattails and other aquatic plants help keep a lake clean.

Improving water quality isn't just about protecting Minnesota's natural assets; it's also about maintaining our economic assets as well

Hardstem Bulrush planting

Fifty hardstem bulrush were planted at 5 locations around Sugar Lake on August 25 by a Sugar Lakescapers team led by Dale Gustafson (pictured below.) The plants are dug into the lake bottom, a clear plastic protective sleeve is placed over the stems and is fastened to a stake driven into the lake bottom. This method

was developed by Dale and has shown some success. The stakes are removed before ice over. Thanks to the rest of the people working on this project: Rick Kanniainen, Don & Cindi Peterson, and Charlotte Quiggle. A DNR permit was required to do this planting.
