Lake Sylvia Starry Stonewort Treatment Plan

Lake Sylvia-Wright County has a plan for treating their starry stone-wort infestation, which includes closing the public access. The expected date is October 19th and plans are that it will be a 3 week closure. The process of treating the public landing will be done by first installing a containment barrier around the area. Next will be hand pulling of the algae that looks like a plant by scuba divers who will then feed it into a suction hose for removal from the water. Using this approach will hopefully keep pieces of the algae and the "stars" (bulbils) produced by the plant from spreading and reproducing. This will be followed-up with a treatment of two chemical applications to try to kill any remaining algae. This combines two of the DNR approved treatment methods. The treatment (pre and post) will be monitored by the Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center at the University of Minnesota.

The site involved is approximately 1/2 acre at the public landing. The DNR has done a complete survey of Lake Sylvia for starry stonewort, and this site is the only known location at this point in time. Funding for the treatment will include support from the DNR and the Wright County AIS Task Force has also recommended to use funds from the county AIS Rapid Response funds. The Sylvia lake association has spent countless hours managing the project and securing the necessary permits and vendors.

Reducing the boat traffic into and out of the landing until treatment starts will assist in keeping the algae from spreading. We cannot overemphasize how very serious of a problem this is for any lake that becomes infected and we encourage every boat leaving Lake Sylvia NOT travel to any other lake or to contact the DNR to request decontamination.

Septic systems & winter

Septic systems can freeze in the winter due to a lack of snow cover, soil problems, leaking plumbing fixtures, cold air entering the system, or a combination of these problems.

If your septic system freezes call a professional. Do not add antifreeze or additives, or run water constantly. Installers and pumpers have the equipment to thaw the system and help evaluate the source of the problem. Unless the underlying problem is solved the system can refreeze.

To prevent freezing:

- Place a layer of mulch over the pipes, tank, and drainfield for insulation.
- Leave the grass over the drainfield a little longer for extra insulation.
- Fix leaking plumbing fixtures.
- Keep all traffic off the drainfield.
- Make sure all septic system risers, inspection pipes, and manholes are securely covered.
- Use warm water. If freezing is a concern spread out water use, wash a warm/hot load of clothes each day, use the dishwasher or take a hot bath. Don't leave water running all the time because it will overload the system

Winter Reminder

If you are out on the lake this winter take the time to pick up any trash left behind. Anything we leave on the ice will be in the water this spring.

ALSO-

Don't forget to remove any buoys or equipment from the lake before ice-over.

Ice safety tips from the Minnesota DNR

Recommended minimum ice thickness

4" of new clear ice is the minimum thickness for travel on foot

5" is minimum for snowmobiles and ATVs 8"- 12" for cars or small trucks

(Remember that these thickness' are merely guidelines for new, clear, solid ice. Many factors other than thickness can cause ice to be unsafe.)

Check for known thin ice areas with a local resort or bait shop.

Test the thickness yourself using an ice chisel, ice auger or even a cordless 1/4 inch drill with a long bit.

Refrain from driving on ice whenever possible.

If you must drive a vehicle, be prepared to leave it in a hurry--keep windows down, unbuckle your seat belt and have a simple emergency plan of action you have discussed with your passengers.

Stay away from alcoholic beverages.

Even "just a couple of beers" are enough to cause a careless error in judgment that could cost you your life. And contrary to common belief, alcohol actually makes you colder rather than warming you up.

Don't "overdrive" your snowmobile's headlight.

At even 30 miles per hour, it can take a much longer distance to stop on ice than your headlight shines. Many fatal snowmobile through-the-ice accidents occur because the machine was travelling too fast for the operator to stop when the headlamp illuminated the hole in the ice.

Wear a life vest under your winter gear.

Or wear one of the new flotation snowmobile suits. And it's a good idea to carry a pair of ice picks that may be home made or purchased from most well stocked sporting goods stores that cater to winter anglers. It's amazing how difficult it can be to pull yourself back onto the surface of unbroken but wet and slippery ice while wearing a snowmobile suit weighted down with 60 lbs of water. The ice picks really help pulling yourself back onto solid ice. **CAUTION: Do NOT wear a flotation device when**

travelling across the ice in an enclosed vehicle!

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
